DESCRIPTIVE OVERVIEW OF THE 2008 SENTENCED RELEASE COHORT

Executive Summary

Number and Gender

The breakdown by gender was 2030 males and 332 females, representing 86% and 14% of the total population, respectively.

The 2030 sentenced males released to the street in 2008 represented a 4% decrease from 2007.

The 332 sentenced females released to the street in 2008 represented a 9% decrease from 2007.

Race and Ethnicity

The racial and ethnic breakdown is different for males and females. 65% of women identify themselves as Caucasian, 22% as Hispanic and 13% as African American.

In contrast, 43% of men identify themselves as Caucasian, 38% as Hispanic and 19% as African American.

The percentage of the male population who identify themselves as African American has remained consistent for the last five years. During the same period, the proportion of males who identify themselves as Caucasian has been increasing while the proportion of Hispanics has been decreasing.

The 2007 release cohort represented the first time in ten years that Caucasian males outnumbered Hispanics. This trend continued in 2008.

Age

While the mean age varies by only 15 months, the female population tends to be older than the male population.

14% of females are under age 25 compared to 23% of males.

Most common age for women is 31, for men 26.

LSI Results

Overall, LSI scores were up for women. High-Risk scores (6-8) increased from 25% in 2007 to 29% in 2008.

Risk level was down slightly for men. High-Risk scores (6-8) decreased from 35% in 2007 to 31% in 2008.

Significantly fewer males and females scored as Low-Risk (0-2).

The number of females with an adult criminal history increased over 24%, juvenile history increased 11%.

Among men, the most notable changes were a 7% decrease in unemployment and a 15% decrease in personal-emotional issues.

42% of females and 48% of males lacked a high school diploma or GED at intake.

Residence

75% of offenders provided a Hampden County Address at intake. Hampshire County had the largest number of out-of-county offenders.

57% of offenders gave a residential address in Springfield, 15% Holyoke and 8% Chicopee.

Springfield neighborhoods accounting for the largest number of offenders were Mason Square (01109) at 24%, Forest Park (01108) 22% and Central (01105) 20%.

86 offenders (19 females, 67 males) failed to provide an address at intake.

Criminal History

51% of females and 53% of males were serving their first adult incarceration.

Two-thirds of offenders have been incarcerated for violating release conditions (probation or parole). This includes the current incarceration.

44% of men and 30% of women had a juvenile record in Massachusetts. Mean age at first arrest was 18 for men and 21 for women. The earliest arrest shown on the BOP was at age 7.

Governing Offense

18% of women and 26% of men were serving sentences for violent offense(s). This was an increase of over 26% from 2007. 76% of women and 67% of men were serving time for nonviolent offense. The balance were technical violators.

72% (102 of 141) of parole violators had been paroled from a nonviolent offense.

The number of men serving time for violations of Lifetime Parole increased from 7 in 2007 to 15 in 2008. This number has the potential to increase exponentially in the future, as all Lifetime Parole violations result in a county sentence in the offender's county of residence, regardless of what facility they were paroled from.

The breakdown of Lifetime Parole violation sentences in 2008 was 10 for a first offense (30 days), 4 for a second offense (180 days) and 1 for a third or subsequent offense (365 days).

<u>Sentence</u>

Mean sentence for women was 249 days (8 months, 9 days), for men 288 days (9 months, 18 days). Most common sentence for both genders was 180 days.

52 women (16%) were sentenced to less than 60 days. 91 (27%) were sentenced to a year of more. For men, 247 (12%) had sentences of less than 60 days, and 699 (34%) were sentenced to a year or more.

Mandatory days served totaled 121,585, an increase of over 1700 days from 2007. School Zone sentences were down 3650 (the equivalent of five 2-year sentences).

Motor vehicle mandatory days increased 17% while firearms decreased 12%. Since the mandatory sentence for carrying a firearm without a license was increased from 365 to 540 days, fewer offenders have received the mandatory sentence.

Classification

151 males had an active Restraining Order at time of release. 232 were identified SRG (10 females, 222 males), another 39 (3 females, 36 males) were SRG-suspected.

58% of women and 63% of men were released from lower security. 435 men attained minimum status in the Community Reentry Unit and 14 men achieved prerelease status in the CRU.

56% of those released from lower security had scored 5 or higher on the LSI. This confirms our policy of promoting step down even for those who are assessed at intake as high risk to recidivate if they comply with their service plan.

Education, employment, criminal associates and mental stability were the major factors differentiating lower security and medium security releases. Offenders who successfully addressed these issues were more likely to earn their way to lower security prior to release.

Release Type

Paroles accounted for 22% of releases in 2008, a 10% decrease from 2007. The number of offenders approved for parole also fell, while postponement and waiver rates increased significantly.

Given that parolees served approximately 52% of their original sentence compared to over 80% for those who wrapped up, this decrease in paroles is a serious concern.

53% of offenders were released without supervision. 25% were released to probation supervision, 16% to parole and 6% to dual supervision by probation and parole.

Medical & Mental Health


55 women and 88 men were designated Special Management-Medical at release, and 12 women and 21 men were designated Special Management-Forensic.

Based on JMS alerts, 133 females and 55 males had a "known forensic issue". 45 (including one female) had a Q5YR alert (suicide risk within past year), and 5 men were designated as an immediate suicide risk at time of release.




Racial Breakdown-Males %

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











LSI Risk by Security Level






Risks/Needs by Security Level at Release-Females
