



DESCRIPTIVE OVERVIEW OF THE 2010 RELEASE COHORT

HAMPDEN COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT

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Executive Summary

At the end of each year, a descriptive overview is prepared of those offenders released during the year. This allows us to monitor any changes in the population and track trends from year to year. Data is used for population management and program development.

Sentenced offenders released to the street will be tracked for three years post release as part of our ongoing recidivism study. Recidivism rates are reported at one and three-year intervals.

Beginning in 2010, we will record disposition of cases for pretrial detainees who participate in the pretrial transitional program.

There were 5110 releases from the HCSD in 2010 (657 females, 4453 males). This represents a decrease of 569 (10%) from 2009.

A total of 2058 sentenced offenders were released (281 females, 1777 males), a decrease of 276 (12%) from 2009. 1907 sentenced offenders (258 females, 1649 males) were released to the street via parole or expiration of sentence, a reduction of 13.6% from the previous year. 151 sentenced offenders were released to other authorities.

A detailed analysis of sentenced offenders released to the street can be found in **Section I.**

There were 3052 pretrial releases (376 females, 2676 males), a decrease of 8.8% from 2009. 2563 pretrial detainees were released to the street via bail, release at court or sentence to time served (350 females, 2213 males). 456 detainees were released to other authorities and 33 probates (all males) purged or paid their debt and were released.

A detailed analysis of the pretrial release cohort can be found in **Section II.**

263 individuals (15 females, 248 males) received a sentence to Mass DOC and were transported to MCI Framingham or MCI Cedar Junction. 9 offenders (1 female, 8 males) were transferred to a DOC facility for a reason other than a new sentence or VOP. These reasons included commitment to Bridgewater State Hospital, DOC Reentry Program failure or court appearance on existing case.

A detailed analysis of offenders sentenced to DOC can be found in **Section III**.

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SECTION I SENTENCED RELEASES TO THE STREET

Summary

Number and Gender

The breakdown by gender was 1649 males and 258 females, representing 87% and 13% of the total population, respectively.

The 1649 sentenced males released to the street in 2010 represented a 14% decrease from 2009.

The 258 sentenced females released to the street in 2010 represented a 12% decrease from 2009.

The release cohort represented 1797 unique individuals (1560 males, 237 females). 83 males and 19 females were released twice during 2010, and 1 female and 3 males were released three times.

Race and Ethnicity

The racial and ethnic breakdown is different for males and females. 68% of women identify themselves as Caucasian, 18% as Hispanic and 14% as African American.

In contrast, 41% of men identify themselves as Caucasian, 41% as Hispanic and 18% as African American.

Age

The mean age of the female population (36 years, 80 days) is nearly three years higher than the male population (33 years, 88 days).

13% of females are under age 25 compared to 25% of males. Over 36 % of females are over age 40 compared to 25% of males.

Most common age for women is 29, for men 23.

LSI Results

Mean LSI score for women remained the same as in 2009 (4.75). Mean score for men increased from 4.81 in 2009 to 5.04 in 2010. Most frequently occurring score for both genders was 5, followed closely by 6.

31% of women and 43% of men scored as High-Risk (6-8). Only 8% scored as Low-Risk (0-2).

The number of females reporting personal-emotional issues increased over 12%.

Among men, the most notable change was a 15 % increase in offenders with a juvenile record, a 5% increase in unemployment and a nearly 10% increase in those who report having criminal associates.

47% of females and 51% of males lacked a high school diploma or GED at intake. This represented a significant increase for females (up from 38% in 2009).

Residence

84% of males and 67% of females provided a Hampden County address at intake. Hampshire County had the largest number of out-of-county offenders.

55% of Hampden County offenders gave a residential address in Springfield, 15% Holyoke and 9% Chicopee.

Neighborhoods accounting for the largest number of offenders from Springfield were Mason Square (01109) and Forest Park (01108) each with 23% and Central (01105) 17%.

35 offenders (6 females, 29 males) failed to provide an address at intake.

Governing Offense

16% of women and 28% of men were serving sentences for violent offense(s). 93 offenders were serving a sentence for violation of probation, 118 for a technical violation of parole and 9 for violating lifetime parole. 71% of technical violators were nonviolent offenders.

The number of men serving time for violations of Lifetime Parole decreased from 22 in 2009 to only 9 in 2010. All violations of Lifetime Parole result in a county sentence in the offender's county of residence, regardless of the facility from which they were paroled.

The breakdown of Lifetime Parole violation sentences in 2010 was 4 for a first offense (30 days), 3 for a second offense (180 days) and 2 for a third or subsequent offense (365 days).

Sentence

Mean sentence for women was 243 days (8 months, 3 days), for men 305 days (10 months, 5 days). Most common sentence for both genders was 180 days.

Females served a mean of 150 days (62% of sentence). Men served 208 days (68% of sentence).

46 women (18%) were sentenced to 60 days or less. 60 (23%) were sentenced to a year or more. For men, 299 (18%) had sentences of 60 days or less, and 600 (36%) were sentenced to a year or more.

Mandatory days served totaled 100,188, a decrease of over 18,000 days from 2009. This significant drop can be attributed to the overall decrease in our count and in school zone and lifetime parole violations. Releases from a county sentence for a school zone violation decreased from 72 in 2009 to 65 in 2010.

Classification

190 males and 7 females had an active Restraining Order at time of release. 176 were identified SRG (162 males, 14 females). 262 males and 10 females had an alert for enemies in the institution.

52% of women and 65% of men were released from lower security. 354 men attained minimum status in the Community Reentry Unit and 10 men achieved prerelease status in the CRU.

63% of those released from lower security had scored 5 or higher on the LSI. This confirms our policy of promoting step down even for those who are assessed at intake as high risk to recidivate if they comply with their service plan.

Employment, criminal associates, family relationships and mental stability were the major factors differentiating lower security and medium security releases. Offenders motivated to address these issues were more likely to earn their way to lower security prior to release.

Release Type

Paroles accounted for 23.6% of releases in 2010, up from 21.7% in 2009.

Parolees served approximately 50% of their original sentence compared to more than 79% for those who completed their sentence.

Medical & Mental Health

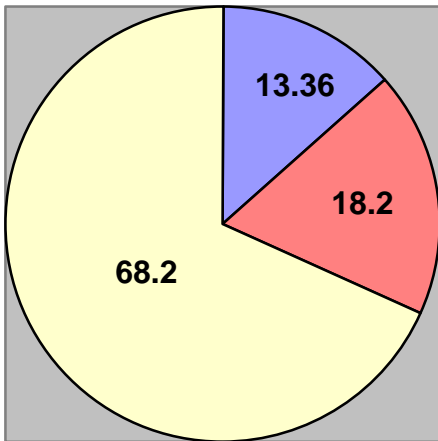
29 women and 72 men were designated Special Management-Medical at release. 160 women and 171 men had alerts for medical or forensic issues.

11 women and 71 men had a Q5YR alert (suicide risk within past year), and 4 men were designated as an immediate suicide risk at time of release.

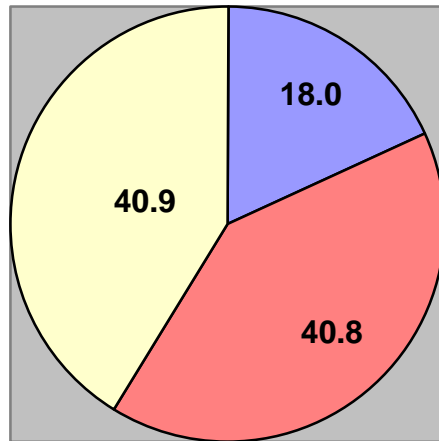

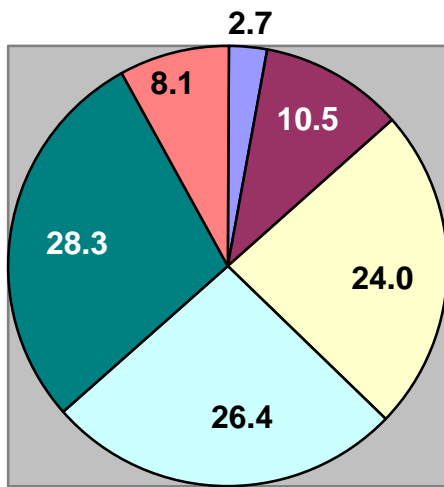
Racial Breakdown-Males

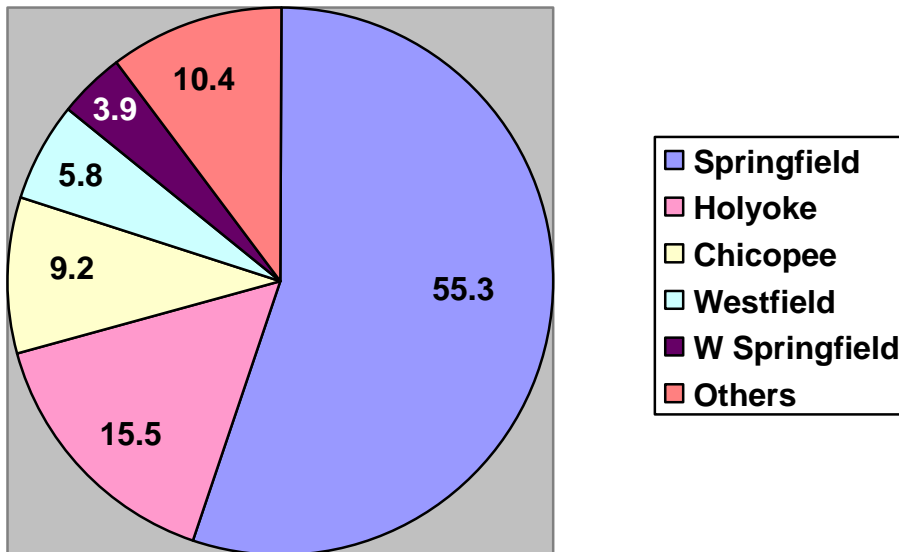

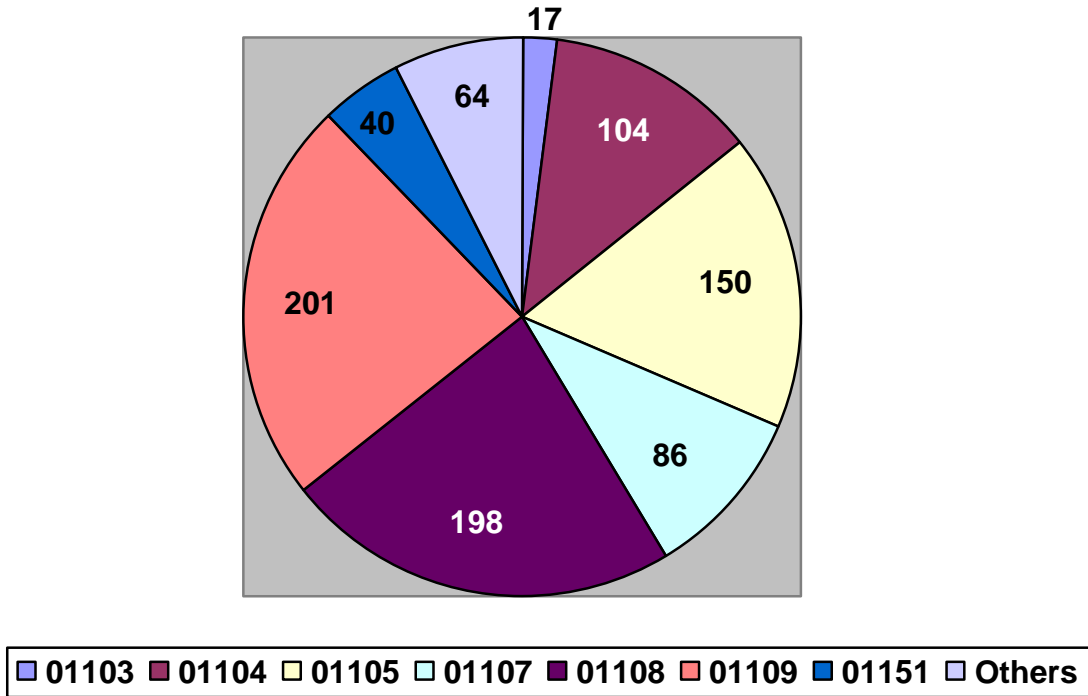

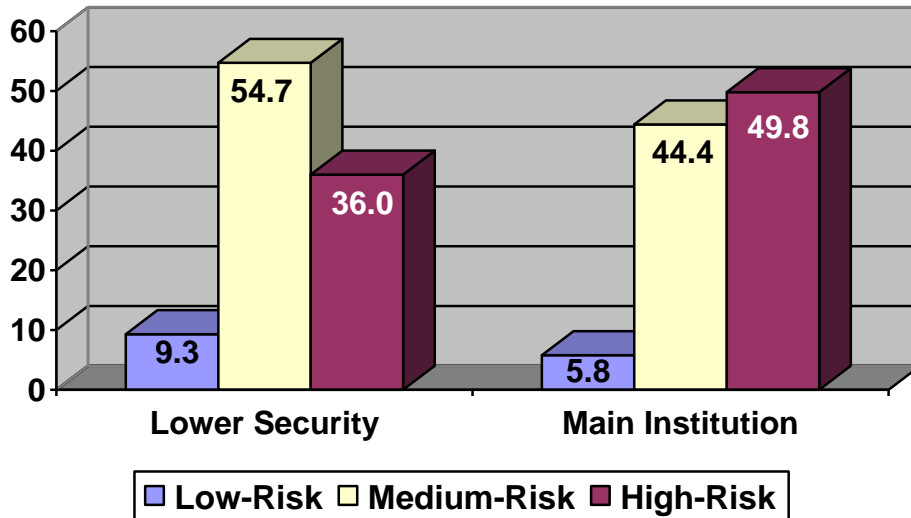

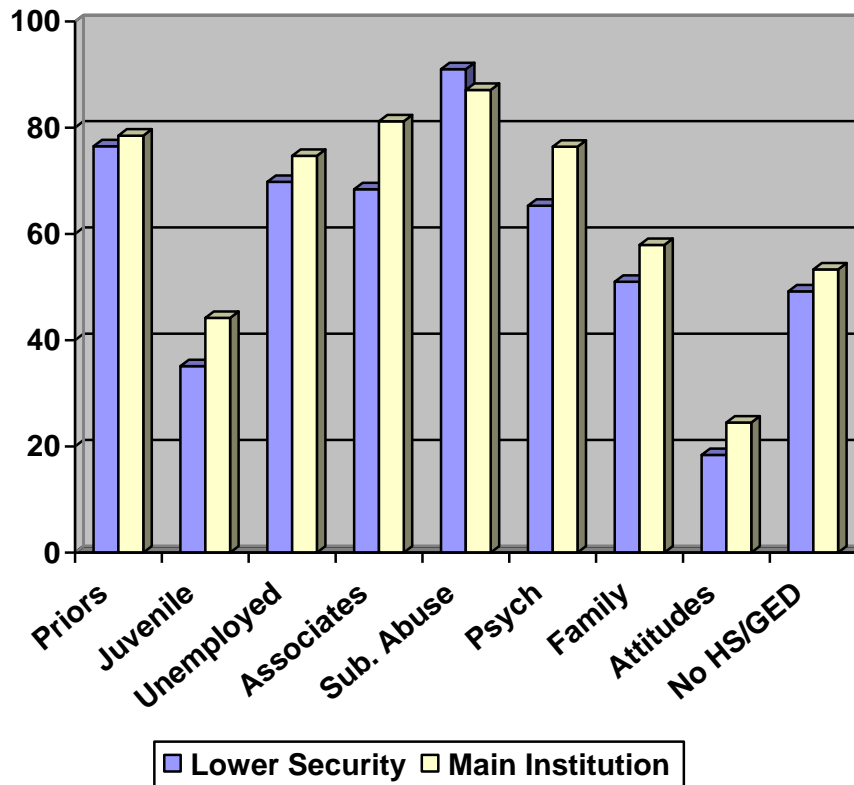
LSI Risk by Security Level

SECTION II PRETRIAL RELEASES TO THE STREET

Summary

Number and Gender

There were 2563 pretrial releases to the street in 2010, 350 females and 2213 males.

The group represented 2317 unique individuals (311 females, 2006 males). 176 males and 29 females were released twice during the year, 14 males and 5 females were released three times and one male was released four times.

720 (28.1%) were bailed, 1579 (61.6%) were released at court and 264 (10.3%) were found guilty and sentenced to time served.

Race and Ethnicity

The racial and ethnic breakdown for the pretrial population reveals a higher percentage of African Americans than the sentenced population, particularly among males. 25% of pretrial males are African American compared to only 17% of sentenced males. For women, the figures are 16% and 14% respectively.

27% of females and 43% of males identify themselves as Hispanic, and 67% of females and 32% of males identified themselves as Caucasian.

Age

As with the sentenced cohort, the female population tends to be older than the male population.

28% of females are under age 25 compared to 34% of males.

Most common age for women is 31, for men 21.

Overall, the pretrial population is younger than the sentenced population.

Residence

51% of females and 56% of males gave a Springfield address at booking. 5% of females and 11% of males were from Holyoke and 10% of females and 7% of males were Chicopee residents.

251 detainees provided an out of county address. 38 pretrial detainees provided no address at intake.

Release

2288 (89%) of pretrial releases were from a Hampden County District Court, 224 (9%) from Hampden Superior Court. The remaining 50 were released from other courts.

726 (28%) were being held on bail of \$2000 or less. 1075 detainees held without right to bail were released at court, and 134 were sentenced to time served.

Governing Offense

1195 (47%) of pretrial releases were held on violent charges. 756 were released at court, and 122 were sentenced to time served.

307 had outstanding warrants and detainers dismissed at court.

Time in Custody

Mean time in custody prior to bail was 27 days. 58% were bailed in the first 10 days and an additional 17% were bailed within 30 days.

Mean time to release at court was 37 days. 45% were released in the first 10 days and an additional 27% within 30 days.

For those sentenced to "time served", the mean was 66 days. 114 (43%) served 30 days or less, 61 (23%) served 31-60 days. 19 individuals served more than 180 days prior to disposition.

Transitional Program

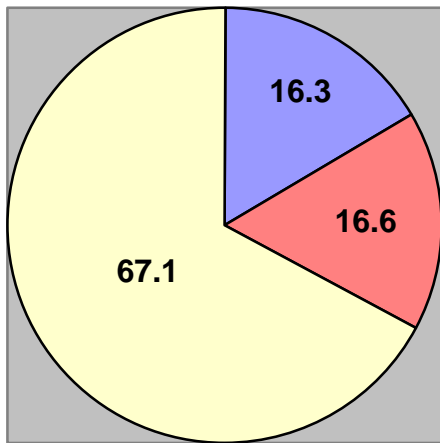
1256 were released prior to being enrolled in the program and 517 were enrolled, but released prior to completion. 376 completed the program, 33 transferred to another location and 16 were terminated for unsatisfactory behavior.

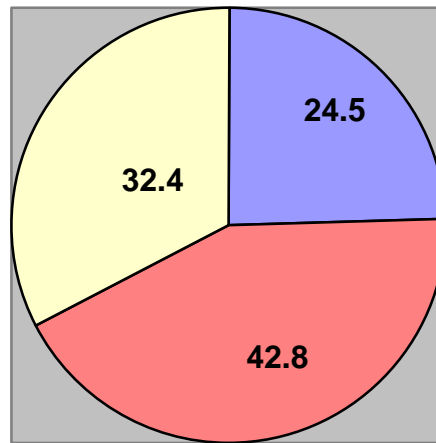

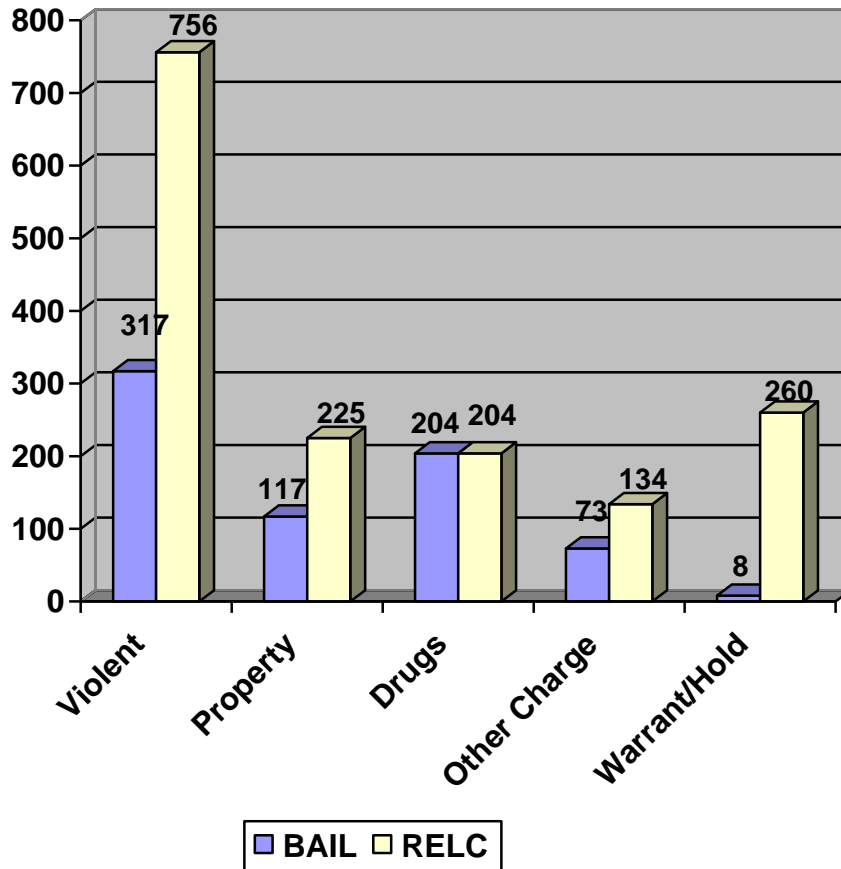

Governing Offense by Release Type



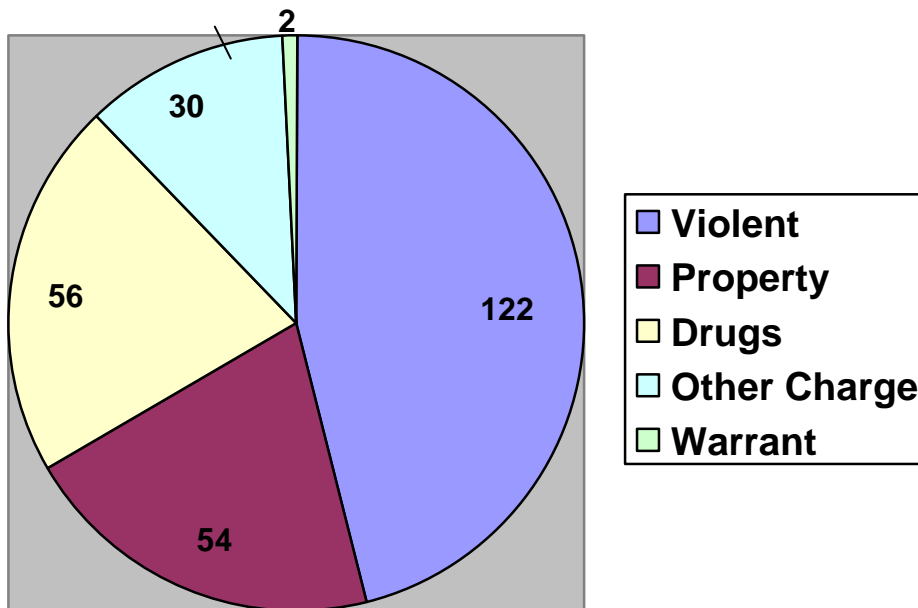

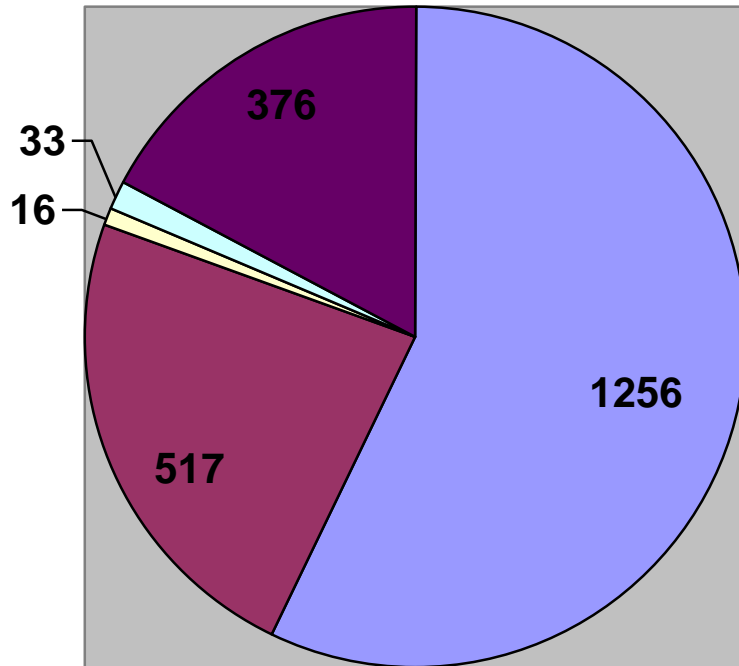

SECTION III OFFENDERS SENTENCED TO DOC

Summary

There were 263 sentences to Mass DOC in 2010, 15 females and 248 males.

These individuals were overwhelmingly minority (35% African American and 49% Hispanic).

53% of males were under age 30.

Mean time to disposition for a nonviolent case was 161 days for females and 291 days for males. Mean time for a murder case (all males) was 613 days.

92 (35%) were sentenced for a nonviolent crime, 165 (63%) for a violent crime and 6 (3%) for a parole violation.

43 offenders (2 women and 41 men) received a mandatory sentence for a nonviolent offense.

Eight men were sentenced on charges of murder or manslaughter. Six received a life sentence.

18 men were sentenced for a sex offense. Mean sentence was 5.5 years.

The most common non-mandatory sentence for a nonviolent offense was 2-3 years. The most common nonviolent *mandatory* sentence was 3 years to 3 years and a day.

Most common sentences for a violent offense were 3 years to 3 years and a day and 2-3 years (tie).

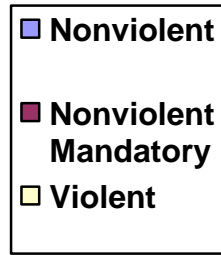
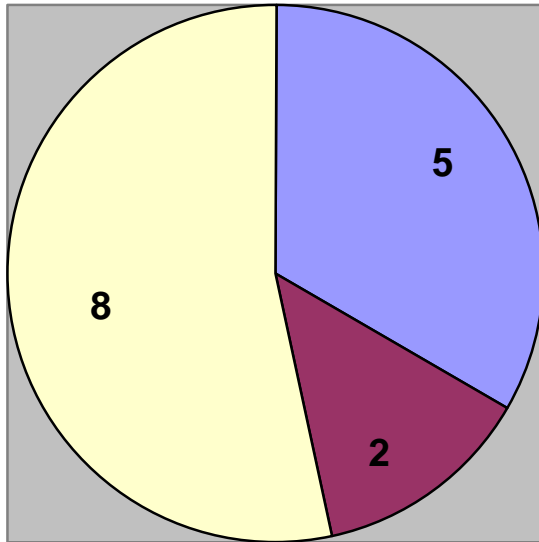
